

Native American Artist-in-Residence program

Theory of change

The Native American Artist-in-Residence (NAAIR) program was created for the purpose of exposing Native American artists working within traditional art forms to Minnesota Historical Society (MNHS) collections in order to: 1) advance their understanding of the traditional form of art and 2) bring this advanced understanding to their communities in a way designed by the artist.

This improvement stems from hands-on access to objects in MNHS's and other museums' collections. In addition, participating in MNHS's business, marketing, and event coordination provides experiential learning in regards to business knowledge and skills for artists. Artists-in-residence are connected to many potential audiences through residency events and workshops. Lastly, artists-in-residence experience greater credibility, increasing their capability to obtain future grants, residencies, or other desired career outcomes. Apprentices experience many of the same impacts as artists-in-residence, with the addition of improving their knowledge about possible directions for their arts career. Similarly, encouragement grantees experience improved arts knowledge and skills as well as increased credibility. Lastly, each of these stakeholders improve their knowledge about MNHS and the NAAIR program.

This is due to the guidance that applicants receive from MNHS staff during the application process. Applicants also improve their knowledge of MNHS and the NAAIR program through the application process.
MNHS staff	BUILDS relationships and shared knowledge among MNHS staff and Native American artists	Facilitates intentional development of relationships among MNHS staff and Native American artists through culturally responsive hosting practices and mutual and reciprocal knowledge-sharing opportunities for MNHS staff and artists	 Increased knowledge, skills, and relationships Improved collections 	The NAAIR program results in increased staff capacities - knowledge, skills, and relationships - for MNHS to fulfill the MNHS value of "Inclusion and collaboration" in respect to Native American artists and the tribally specific art forms they practice. Additionally, NAAIR improves MNHS collections by increasing culturally specific knowledge of Native American objects as well as by adding contemporary Native American objects.
