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Introduction

This brief report summarizes information about the guests served at the St. Paul Homeless Connect event held on June 28, 2011 at the St. Paul RiverCentre. The sixth such event to be held in St. Paul, the event was organized by the City of St. Paul and Ramsey County.

Overall, St. Paul Homeless Connect served:

- 1,119 households¹
- 1,387 individuals
- 268 children age 17 or younger
- 89 unaccompanied youth age 14-21

After a discussion of data collection methods, this report presents a brief comparison of the population served at this event to the population of guests served at the previous St. Paul Homeless Connect events, along with Homeless Connect events held elsewhere in Minnesota. This report also includes a series of tables summarizing characteristics of guests served at Homeless Connect, including: basic demographics, living situation, income and sources of assistance, and services sought.

Methods

The data reported below were collected on paper by volunteer intake workers on the day of the event, using the form found in the Appendix. The data were later entered into Minnesota's Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) by a team of trained data entry volunteers. Minnesota's HMIS is a statewide database that includes client-level data from many agencies that serve people experiencing homelessness or at risk of experiencing homelessness.²


Households include couples with and without children, single heads of household with children, and guests identifying as an "other" household type.

Comparison with previous East Metro/St. Paul Homeless Connect events


The St. Paul Homeless Connect is a one-day event that connects people experiencing homelessness with a wide range of support services. The most recent event was held on June 28, 2011 at the RiverCentre in downtown St. Paul. The event served 1,387 individuals, nearly the same number served at the June 2010 event.³

1. Households and individuals served at event – comparison to previous events



The 2011 event served a similar proportion of families and individuals as the 2010 event, with slightly more than one-quarter of adults identifying as part of a family with children and the other three-quarters as singles or part of a household without children.

The 2011 event served a greater proportion of guests identifying as not currently homeless or long-term homeless than at previous events. Thirty percent of guests at the 2011 event identified as not currently homeless, compared to 20 percent of guests at the 2010 event and 26 percent at the 2009 event. Nearly one-quarter of all guests at the 2011 event identified as long-term homeless. At previous events, roughly one-fifth of guests identified as long-term homeless.

Half of all guests attending the event reported having a disability of long duration, an increase from previous events (44% in 2010 and 40% in 2009). The proportion of guests identifying as veterans (10%) remained similar to previous years, as did those who reported attending a previous Homeless Connect event (31%).

The proportion of households at the 2011 event receiving various forms of cash income assistance decreased, particularly for those receiving General Assistance (only 28% in 2011 compared with 42% in 2010 and 33% in 2009). However, the proportion of households receiving non-cash benefits remained similar to previous events.

Housing assistance was the most commonly-requested service across all demographic groups except youth, who ranked employment assistance slightly more frequently. Guests with children were most likely to request housing assistance, employment assistance, emergency shelter and education, relative to other demographic groups. The types of services requested by clients remained similar to previous events.

The remainder of this report presents information on the guests served at the June 2011 St. Paul Homeless Connect, including demographic characteristics, living situation, income and sources of assistance, and services sought by event guests.



Conclusion

The June 2011 St. Paul Homeless Connect event served over 1,300 guests who varied by age, household type, and housing status. Housing, transportation assistance, and assistance obtaining a Minnesota ID were the most commonly sought services at the event. More guests with children requested housing assistance, employment assistance, emergency shelter, and education than did other demographic groups.

The 2011 event served a greater proportion of guests identifying as not currently homeless than at previous events. However, the proportion of guests identifying as long-term homeless also increased, as did those reporting a disability of long duration. The proportion of households at the 2011 event receiving various forms of cash income assistance decreased, while the proportion of those reporting non-cash benefit assistance remained similar to previous events.

Demographic characteristics of guests suggest that the event continues to serve guests experiencing a high level of need for the types of services provided at St. Paul Homeless Connect.
