## Introduction

Jackson Street Village is a supportive housing community located in Saint Paul's North End neighborhood that provides permanent housing for 24 previously homeless or precariously housed families. The property is owned by RS Eden and managed by Wilder Foundation's Supportive Housing and Employment Services (SHES) division. The philosophy of Jackson Street Village is to identify and use individual, family, and community strengths to address residents' needs and challenges. Many of the adult residents have struggled with chemical dependency, mental illness, or both. Parents and their children have often lived in environments that compromised their physical health. Jackson Street Village provides decent, healthy housing that is an important foundation for family stability.

The program was conceived six years ago as a response to the growing number of homeless families that needed support in a setting where they could access ongoing assistance and encouragement. It opened in March of 2003 and was developed through collaboration between RS Eden, the American Lung Association of Minnesota, Amherst H. Wilder Foundation, and the University of Minnesota. The town homes were designed using the American Lung Association's Health House strategy. Each building was constructed utilizing materials that reduce indoor particulates and technology that increases the amount of clean air circulated to help reduce respiratory infections and improve the overall health of tenants. Since it opened in 2003, Jackson Street Village has had a 22 percent turnover and no evictions.

Wilder staff offer individual assistance for each member of the community. This includes assistance with connecting families to a health care provider, assisting parents with registering their children for school, transporting families to appointments, connecting families to appropriate resources, preparing for and finding a job, and providing for basic needs. Staff members also work to engage the community as a whole through children's activities, skill-building workshops, and family gatherings.

### Summary of action items

- Jackson Street Village residents continue to experience life circumstances that may interfere with their housing stability. Therefore, the support and services provided by staff may be critical to the continued housing stability and long-term outcomes of residents.
- Adult residents of Jackson Street Village appear to be experiencing continued barriers to employment, especially stable and livingwage jobs. Therefore, staff should continue to focus on assessment and job training to ensure all adult residents are employed to their full potential.
- Jackson Street Village residents appear to have serious mental and/or physical health problems that interfere with their ability to maintain stable housing and employment. Furthermore, residents' self-reported health problems appear to have become more frequent at follow-up compared to baseline, which could be attributed to actual declines in health or to residents' increased awareness or knowledge of health issues since moving to Jackson Street Village. In either case, staff should continue to find ways to encourage healthy lifestyles among residents and to address individual residents' specific health concerns or problems.
- It appears that safety and security are major concerns for some residents. Therefore, staff should consider possible ways to address their concerns and empower residents to find their own ways of improving the safety at Jackson Street Village.

In the first operating year (2003-2004), Wilder Research conducted baseline and follow-up face-to-face interviews with Jackson Street Village residents to examine program effectiveness and resident satisfaction. Jackson Street Village has eight goals:

- 1. Families will maintain stable housing.
- 2. Adults will have stable income through employment or another appropriate income source.
- 3. Preschool age children will participate in early childhood education activities and children of school age will maintain regular school attendance.
- 4. Family members will engage in community activities (recreation center, church, volunteer activities, block club, and neighborhood involvement).
- 5. Family members will become less reliant on emergency room care by establishing a designated primary care provider, enrolling in a health insurance plan, and keeping their children's immunizations up-to-date.
- 6. Families will improve their health status, especially respiratory health.
- 7. Living at Jackson Street Village will help families improve their lives.
- 8. Families will be satisfied with their current living arrangements.

Baseline surveys were conducted with 17 of the 24 heads of household during the summer of 2003 for a response rate of 71 percent. Seven heads of household refused to be interviewed. The baseline survey asked residents about their previous employment and housing situations; barriers to maintaining stability; any health problems of family members (including physical and mental health and chemical dependency); school attendance and any school-related problems of children in the family; and income sources. In fall 2004, follow-up surveys were conducted with 13 out of the 17 residents who completed a baseline survey for a response rate of 76 percent. Two of the original families had moved out of Jackson Street Village and the other two former respondents refused to complete the interview. The follow-up survey asked many of the same questions as the baseline survey, as well as inquiring about any changes in the residents' situations since the previous interview. Residents were also asked about their satisfaction with living at Jackson Street Village.

In addition, residents were asked to complete the Short Form-36 version 2 (SF-36v2) Health Survey (QualityMetric, Inc., 2000) at both baseline and follow-up in order to assess changes in their overall mental and physical health since moving to Jackson Street Village. Overall, Wilder Research was able to complete 11 follow-up SF-36v2 surveys out of the 17 who completed the baseline survey, for a response rate of 65 percent.

In general, data is reported for all residents who answered the question. In cases where baseline and follow-up survey data is compared, only residents who answered <u>both</u> the baseline and the follow-up questions were included. Therefore, the number of residents (Ns) vary by table, depending on how many answered that particular set of questions.

## **Outcome goal 1**

# Families will maintain stable housing.

## Key findings

- Residents' housing stability has increased since moving to Jackson Street Village. About two-thirds of the respondents were homeless in the year prior to moving to Jackson Street Village and half were homeless immediately prior to moving to Jackson Street Village.
- The cost of housing was reported by respondents as one of the primary barriers to maintaining stable housing in the past. Since moving to Jackson Street Village, over three-quarters of the respondents report "no difficulty" paying their rent.

### Action item

 Jackson Street Village residents continue to experience life circumstances that may interfere with their housing stability. Therefore, the support and services provided by staff may be critical to the continued housing stability and long-term outcomes of residents.

## Adults will have a stable income through employment or another appropriate income source.

## Key findings

- The number of respondents employed at the time of follow-up remained about the same as the number employed prior to moving to Jackson Street Village. The average number of hours worked per week and the average hourly wage decreased.
- The number of respondents receiving MFIP and SSDI remains unchanged from baseline to follow-up, while the number of respondents receiving child support, SSI, or disability income (other than SSI) has increased.

### Action items

Adult residents of Jackson Street Village appear to be experiencing continued barriers to employment, especially stable and livingwage jobs. Therefore, staff should continue to focus on assessment and job training to ensure all adult residents are employed to their full potential.

## **Outcome goal 3**

Preschool age children will participate in early childhood education activities and children of school age will maintain regular school attendance.

## Key findings

Although fewer children are reported to have learning or school problems since moving to Jackson Street Village as compared to the school year just prior to moving in a higher percent of children have an Individual Education Plan (IEP) (Figure 5).

## **Outcome goal 5**

Family members will become less reliant on emergency room care by establishing a designated primary care provider, enrolling in a health insurance plan, and keeping their children's immunizations up-to-date.

## Key findings

- The percentage of respondents reporting that immunizations were up-to-date for their children decreased from 100 to 83 percent.
- Emergency room visits have decreased, mainly because the average number of visits per resident (of those who went to the ER at least once) decreased significantly.

# Families have improved health status, especially respiratory health.

## Key findings

- Most respondents have significant physical and/or mental health problems that indicate possible barriers to daily activities such as employment, education, and maintaining stable housing. Close to three-quarters of respondents report receiving a mental health diagnosis within the two years prior to moving into Jackson Street Village, most commonly for major depression (Figure 9).
- Increasing percentages of respondents report a need to see a medical professional for their children's health, their own physical health, and their own alcohol or drug problems. In addition, an increased percentage report asthma or chronic respiratory problems among their children. This could reflect an increase in parents' awareness of health needs and motivation to address them or an undesirable decrease in resident's actual health status. Given the consistent positive results on the Health Survey, the more positive results seem more likely (Figure 9).
- None of the residents who participated in the follow-up survey had been admitted to detox since moving to Jackson Street Village.
- The SF-36 Health Survey was administered to respondents at baseline and follow-up (11 respondents completed the questionnaire at both times). The results indicate several things. It is important to note that these respondents' scores on all scales (Physical Functioning, Role-Physical, Bodily Pain, General Health, Vitality, Social Functioning, Role-Emotional, and Mental Health) are substantially lower than the U.S. average, which indicates that Jackson Street Village residents do have significant physical and mental health issues (Figure 10).

Although the SF-36 Health Survey scores continue to be substantially below the U.S. adult average, all but one sub-scale score improved from baseline to follow-up despite the fact that there were no statistical differences on individual or composite scores. It is likely that with a larger population some of the observed changes would be statistically significant (Figure 10).

### Action items

■ Jackson Street Village residents appear to have serious mental and/or physical health problems that interfere with their ability to maintain stable housing and employment. Furthermore, residents' self-reported health problems appear to have become more frequent at follow-up compared to baseline, which could be attributed to actual declines in health or to residents' increased awareness or knowledge of health issues since moving to Jackson Street Village. In either case, staff should continue to find ways to encourage healthy lifestyles among residents and to address individual residents' specific health concerns or problems.
